The Cross-Acceptance Process in New Jersey is a collaborative planning effort designed to align local, county, and state planning policies and ensure consistency with the New Jersey State Development and Redevelopment Plan (SDRP). This process aims to create a shared vision for growth, preservation, and development across New Jersey. Here's an overview of how it works:

- Initiation: The New Jersey Office of Planning Advocacy (OPA), under the State Planning Commission, initiates the cross-acceptance process to update the State Development and Redevelopment Plan.
- Local Participation: Counties, municipalities, and regional entities participate in the process. Local governments review the state's SDRP and provide feedback based on their own planning documents, such as municipal master plans and zoning ordinances.
- Comparative Analysis: Counties act as the lead agencies and work with municipalities to compare their local plans and policies with the goals and objectives of the SDRP. This comparative analysis highlights areas of agreement, as well as any inconsistencies or conflicts.
- Negotiation and Consensus: Through a series of meetings and discussions, stakeholders (counties, municipalities, and the state) negotiate changes to the SDRP, aiming to reach a consensus on how local plans align with the state's broader goals for smart growth, preservation, and sustainable development.
- Reporting: After these negotiations, the counties prepare Cross-Acceptance Reports summarizing their findings and recommendations for adjustments to the SDRP.
- Final Adoption: The recommendations from the cross-acceptance process are then used to update and refine the SDRP. The State Planning Commission reviews the suggested revisions and adopts the final plan.
